

I began exploring what 'local' means to me through the diverse cultures and landscapes of this land, and the ways its identity has evolved over time.



Inspiration

My search for what 'local' means led me to cotton, one of the first crops grown in this land. I explored its varieties and visited a cotton gin in the western Negev.



From the gin, I took raw cotton and embraced it in different ways, preserving its every part and keeping its raw essence intact.



I then turned to explore the wool industry, ancient and rooted in many cultures yet almost entirely disappeared. In the southern Hebron hills I met Salma, a shepherdess who spins wool by hand to support her family. I experimented with different felting techniques using her wool.



As part of my research, I connected with the Bedouin community in the southern Negev, where wool craft is an essential part of their culture. I cleaned, filtered and felted the Bedouin wool.

Part of the hand-spun wool was knitted in various ways. Through this process, I also developed a method of joining pieces using knitted connections.
